

Golf Club News









What Does This Mean for Gladstone

The Economic Forum was held recently in Port Pirie. South Australia is strategically placed to capitalise on the global shift towards renewable energy and sustainable technologies. The abundant copper and magnetite iron ore resources for sustainable technologies like electric vehicles, wind turbines and green steel production further solidified its role in the green economy. The plan to build the world's largest Hydrogen Power Plant at Whyalla facilitates industrial processes like steel production.

These initiatives will create employment opportunities in South Australia, particularly in the Spencer Gulf region. What does this mean for Gladstone? This development will ensure the viability of the Port Pirie Smelter for the next 50 years. As a satellite town to Port Pirie there will be a causal sequence that will drive up the need for family housing, other accommodations for transient work forces and the flow on from that will drive increased need in domestic suppliers, trade providers, education etc.

Housing will be one of the early challenges. This provides individuals with opportunities to develop their own properties, sell land, look at other options for accommodation provision. What can we each bring to the table, to contribute to growth?

From March 1st 2024 new smoke-free and vape-free laws have come into force. Smoking and vaping will be **banned** from a variety of public outdoor areas in South Australia. These include:

- early childhood services premises
- Entrances to shopping centres
- at hospitals and health facilities.
- within outdoor public swimming facilities
- * at major event venues
- * within ten metres of a sporting venue during an underage sporting event.
- on beaches within 50 metres of the red/yellow flags
- * within five metres of a jetty.

The Annual Gladstone Art Exhibition.

History

The first Gladstone Community Art Exhibition was held in the Gladstone High School Hall in November 1976. It was the initiative of the late Richard (Dick) Biles who was the art teacher at the High School at that time. Artists from all over the State as well as regional artists were invited to submit works which would also be available for sale. The exhibition not only offered a cultural experience for visitors, but also an opportunity for students to enhance their art education by viewing the work of other artists.

The proceeds from the sale of art work were used to purchase works to be displayed around the school; the selected work was decided by a consensus of the school staff.

This exhibition became an annual event under Dick Biles' direction and supported by the school staff until his resignation due to illness in 1997.

In 1997 It was decided to widen the display at the exhibition to include art and craft work by students. An encouragement award was introduced for young artists as well as a People's Choice Award.

The last exhibition was held at the High School in 2001 when school resources needed to be redirected.

In 2008 a proposal was put to the Gladstone Community Development and Tourism Association (GCD&TA) by Gladstone resident Annette Ognjanovic for the construction of a gallery building to house a large Panoramic painting of a Southern Flinders scene to be executed by panorama painter Jeff Morgan. This proposal was to provide a unique attraction for visitors thus leading to a social and economic benefit for Gladstone. Such a development would require a huge injection of funds and among many suggestions for fund raising was the reintroduction of the Annual Gladstone Art Exhibition, this time to be a fund raising project of the GCD&TA.

A subcommittee was established to organise and manage the event and the first exhibition was held in September 2009 in the Gladstone Town Hall. The exhibition was open to all artists in both 2 and 3 dimensional forms and continued to feature the work of students not only from Gladstone High School, but all schools in the Rocky River District.

Subsequent feasibility studies which highlighted the difficulties in advancing the Panorama Project led to the project being shelved, but the success of the Art Exhibition has resulted in a significant annual event for Gladstone and as a participant in the "Brush with Art" programme, has become part of a major South Australian regional art event.

Proceeds from the Exhibition will be used toward projects aimed at arts development in the community and cultural tourism.

The 2024 Exhibition will be the 15th year in this format (the 2020 exhibition was cancelled due to Covid) and the 41st Gladstone Art Exhibition.

The ANZAC Dawn Service will be held on Thursday the 25 April at the Gladstone Street war memorial. The service will start at 6.15am prompt.

This year everybody will meet at the war memorial. Previously people met at the RSL building and marched to the war memorial. Due to the low numbers of veterans leading the march it was decided to meet at the war memorial. Posters will be put around on the notice boards.

Another change for this year is that there will not be a 'gunfire' breakfast at the Gladstone bowling club house. Tim Zander and some volunteers are instead having a marquee set up at the war memorial and will serve tea, coffee and scones. A donation tin will be available.

The 6th of June 1944 was D Day. The allied invasion of Normandy. The force included 7,000 ships and landing craft manned by over 195,000 naval personnel. By June the 30th 1944 850,000 men, 148,000 vehicles and 570,000 tons of supplies had landed.

The Cowra break out took place on the 5th of August 1944. The Japanese prisoners of war with improvised weapons stormed the perimeter fence and overcome the machine gun posts. As a result, 231 Japanese were killed, 108 injured. 4 Australian soldiers were killed.

The land battles in new Guinea with defeat of the Japanese at Wau and clearing the Japanese from the Huon peninsular was completed by April 1944. The Australian army then began campaigns against the Japanese garrisons from Borneo, Bougainville, new Britain and at Ai tape New Guinea.

With the terrible death toll in Ukraine and Israel from invading forces. The terrorists' random attacks make one wonder what a human life is worth. We live in one of the best countries in the world, which was defended during WW2 by service personnel, too many making the supreme sacrifice. We hope and pray that this will never happen again.
